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A MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRESIDENT

There are several things that I believe every F. F. A. member should be thinking about in behalf of his chapter.

He should be making a great effort to get new members, especially if his chapter membership is small. I do not mean by this statement that he should unduly induce students to become members of the chapter. I believe we sometimes fail in our duty to make F.F.A. work attractive to the boys in vocational agriculture work who would make creditable members. This includes members and local advisers. The reason I am stressing the need of soliciting new members is because of the fact that the Alabama Association decreased last year in membership from about twenty-two hundred to a little less than fourteen hundred. This simply means that F.F.A. work in Alabama was two-thirds as strong in 1932-33 as it was in 1931-32. We should not and will not be satisfied until our membership is two thousand or more at the end of 1933-34. I should like for the vice-president of every chapter to give this especial attention, for he is chairman of the membership committee.

Is your chapter familiar with the local program of work, the state program of work, and the national program of work? Your local chapter secretary should be keeping an accurate and complete record of all the objectives that your chapter accomplishes. This will enable him to make an accurate report of accomplishments to the state adviser at the end of the year.

Another thing I believe will be of interest and help to our F.F.A. work is our radio program. I should like for every chapter in the State to have some part in putting on a radio program or at least listen in on the national radio program. The national radio program is broadcast over the N.B.C. Farm and Home Hour every second Monday in the month except when the National Convention of F.F.A. is held, November 17-24 at Kansas City. The November date of F. F. A. broadcast has been changed from November 13 to November 21. The program for this date will come from Kansas City entirely and at that time the members will be able to hear the boys who are competing for honors in the National F.F.A. Public Speaking Contest. I hope that every F.F.A. member will be able to turn on his radio or that of a friend and hear the program on November 21.

LAMAR JEFFERS HONORED AT VOCATIONAL BANQUET AT WETUMPKA

At a father-son-mother-daughter banquet given jointly by the Wetumpka Chapter of Future Farmers of America and the department of vocational home economics at the State Secondary Agricultural School at Wetumpka on Friday night, October 20, Honorable Lamar Jeffers, Representative in Congress from the Fourth Alabama District, was presented a key signifying election to the degree of "State Farmer" by the Executive Committee of the state organization of Future Farmers of America. The key, presented by Earnest Thornhill, past president of the State Association, represents the highest honor that the state organization can bestow in recognition of Mr. Jeffers' outstanding work in Congress in fighting for vocational work when efforts were being made to withdraw Federal funds for this type of training.

In his talk to the group of about seventy boys and girls in vocational home economics and agriculture and about fifty fathers and mothers and other guests, Mr. Jeffers stressed the importance of boys and girls taking up early in life the challenge of the future. He further stated his great faith in vocational training for boys and girls.

The banquet was presided over by Vivian Wade, a student in vocational home economics at Wetumpka. The program included, besides the address by Mr. Jeffers, an outline of the activities of the F. F. A. and some of the accomplishments of the Wetumpka Chapter last year, by Charles Owsley, past president; this year's activities, by E. L. Thompson, president for the coming year; the reading of the prize-winning essay in home economics by Julia Ellen Bass; the programs of vocational home economics and agriculture at Wetumpka, by Miss Sarah Stevenson, teacher of vocational home economics, and T. H. LeCroy, teacher of vocational agriculture; and music and stunts by members of the student group.

This banquet was the second annual father-son-mother-daughter banquet to be given jointly by the department of home economics and the F.F.A. at Wetumpka, and represents only one of the many activities sponsored by those groups of wide-awake boys and girls.

PROGRAM OF WORK OF THE ISABELLA CHAPTER FOR 1933-34

- 1. Have an active F. F. A. chapter with not less than four members holding the State Farmer Degree by the end of the state convention in July 1934.
- 2. Have at least five members to attend the state convention at Auburn, two of which will be delegates.
- 3. Hold annual father-son-mother-daughter banquet.
- 4. Keep in touch with state organization by sending in annual program of work accomplishments before June 1, 1934.
- 5. Confer the degree of Future Farmer as rapidly as Green Hand members are eligible.
- 5. Start F. F. A. library in agricultural building or school.
- 7. Aid our local adviser in supervised practice program by (a) helping to make project standards for various types of programs and (b) promoting the keeping of accurate project records.
- 8. Sponsor live-at-home program by making a five-year plan to suit the need of the community.
- 9. Start some cooperative projects for the surrounding communities! benefit, such as: (1) community hot-beds, (3) rat killing campaign.
- 10. Start F. F. A. nursery for beautifying school campus, homes and community buildings.
- 11. Each F. F. A. member take home beautification project.
- 12. Have two or more joint meetings with home economics club during school year.
- 13. Each F. F. A. member help local adviser in at least one night school.
- 14. Have at least three social entertainments during the year.
- 15. Construct dressing room and shower for the athletic department of the school.
- 16. Each member pay chapter dues out of profit from this year's project before October 20, 1933.
- 17. Procure necessary equipment for conducting chapter meetings and conduct meetings as recommended in the F. F. A. manual.
- 18. Help to uphold the state organization by sending in suggestions for the improvement of same.
- 19. At least the officers of the chapter own an F. F. A. manual.
- 20. Establish F. F. A. bulletin board.
