


Overview

The Alabama FFA Association was founded in 1929 and was the 36th state association chartered by the National FFA Organization. The FFA is the state and national organization for students enrolled in agriscience education. The association has a long history of proven performance on the state and national levels. When FFA began in Alabama there were 113 vocational agriculture departments. Fiftyone of them applied for charters to begin FFA chapters. The earliest FFA contests in Alabama were the radio and essay: which began in 1935. The string band and public speaking contests began in 1936. The quartet contest began in 1945. It wasn't until 1950 that many of the traditional FFA contests, such as livestock, dairy, and agricultural (farm) mechanics began.

The Alabama FFA Association provides many opportunities for students to showcase what they have learned in the classroom and through their supervised agricultural experience (SAE) program. Agriscience education in Alabama is designed as a three-part model: FFA, SAE, and Classroom and Laboratory Instruction.

Classroom and laboratory instruction is the basis for everything that is done in agriscience education. The

agriscience education mission is to prepare students for successful careers and a lifetime of informed choices in the global agriculture, food, fiber, and natural resources systems.

A student's SAE project is an extension of the classroom experience. The student has an opportunity to learn through hands-on applications outside of the regularly scheduled class time.

The FFA mission is to make a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth, and career success through agriscience education.

The Alabama FFA selects its best to represent the organization each year. Six state officers serve the organization from one state convention to the next. The state officers serve on the Executive Committee of the Alabama FFA Association and conduct the business of the organization. The state officers also visit chapters and attempt to inspire chapters to be in a perpetual state of improvement

District Organization

FFA in Alabama is divided into three districts: North, Central, and South. District FFA Eliminations are conducted each year to reduce the number of teams competing in various Career Development Events (CDEs) at the state level. The districts also select officer teams each year through an application and interview process. These officers also conduct chapter visits, give speeches, and conduct workshops for chapters.

FFA Chapters



The key to the success of FFA is local chapter involvement. Agriscience programs at local public schools have a FFA advisor that is responsible for coordinating the activities of the local FFA chapter and informing the member of opportunities available to them through the organization. Local chapters develop a program of activities each year that serves as a road map for the chapter's activities. Chapters across the state conduct various community service projects, chapter leadership development workshops, or student development activities.


